Network New Ulm was formed in response to an identified need for a community-based leadership training program in New Ulm. The program began in 1997 with the first “class” of 24 community leaders graduating in 1998. Graduates formed the Network New Ulm Alumni, whose primary purpose is the Network New Ulm Youth Leadership Program, which began in 2001. Junior and Seniors from NUHS, CHS, MVL and ALC meet for six sessions each year to increase community awareness and foster youth leaders.



Network New Ulm Youth participants will be able to tour different businesses and schools in our community. Some of the things our students experienced this last year were visiting a dairy farm, learning about New Ulm’s history, fun team-building activities, participating in a mock trial and mock city council meeting, touring our local law enforcement center, creating a radio commercial for NNUY, and much much more!



Applications are available for 2022-2023 Juniors and Seniors. You can pick up an application at your high school, access it on the New Ulm Chamber website or simply scan the QR code at the bottom of this flyer to access the form. 28 students will be chosen from the applications and notified of their acceptance later this summer.
